

A word from Bob Dwyer, Jr.



For those of you that have no idea what that headline means, I'm talking about ceramic outdoor grills (cookers). Ceramic grills are a popular item; they hold heat and retain moisture and flavor much

better than a standard grill. You really must see one to understand. These grills are nothing like the charcoal grills you are used to - so if your curiosity is peeked you can see or experience a ceramic cooker at our grill store. Now, back to the headline, for those of you that own or are thinking about one of these grills let's break down the differences between the two grills and see what we end up with.

Starting at the point of ship-

#1The Green Egg comes unassembled. The Primo comes assembled. Let's count this as one big plus for the Primo considering how extremely heavy these grills are due to their composition.

Ceramics:

#2 Both of these grills have good ceramics and I think both grills will do an equal job cooking as far as temperature. Let's call this a draw - both excellent.

What's Best: Big **Green Egg or Primo?**

#3 The height of the Green Egg in the cradle is a little short for the average person. The Primo is closer to standard counter height. One more for the Primo.

#4 The Green Egg is only offered in a round shape, the Primo comes round or oval and the design does make a difference in what you are hoping to accomplish. That's one more point for the Primo.

Functionality/Practicality/ Efficiency:

#5 The Primo has split racks (two cooking racks) vs. the Green Egg which has a one piece rack - having the spilt rack gives the Primo some options you can not get with the Egg. That's yet another one for

#6 The Primo oval has a popular option not available on the egg, a divider to cook direct and indirect at the same time. Final point goes to Primo

When I was researching these grills I was really impressed with the Green Egg. Green Egg is tethered to a highly successful marketing promotion ... they really know how to sell the product and it is a good product, however, I believe the Primo offers more than the Green Egg.

One huge thing I couldn't get past with the Green Egg was that it's not made in the USA.

The company is headquartered in the USA but they manufacture the grill in Mexico. This bothers me because they do such a great job selling the grill to hard working Americans but choose to send production out of the country ... this take jobs and money away from the same people they want to purchase their product. When I think Grills I think hotdogs, hamburgers. I think the 4th of July, I think American. For me the Primo is the winner hands-down. I know a lot of people have and love the Big Green Egg and like I said it's a great grill ... I just think the Primo has more benefits. I know there are a lot of BGE owners gritting their teeth and not agreeing with me and I'm sorry about that; I'm just calling it like I see it. I do invite Big Green Egg owners and everyone else to stop in and chat about grills. Maybe while you're here we can exchange some grilling ideas. I stared with six manufactures of grills all of them made right here in the USA by companies of excellence that "set the bar" of standards very high for their competitors.

WHITE SPOTS ON A WOOD SURFACE DUE TO MOISUTRE? Spread a thick layer of petroleum jelly over the spot, let sit for 48 hours then wipe off.

REMOVE LIPSTICK STAINS ON WASHABLE FAB-**RICS** with petroleum jelly. Rub stained area until stain is loosened then remove the substance and the stain with hair shampoo.

CUPBOARD KNOBS – drawer pulls that are loose; cut a washer from sand paper, place washer between drawer and knob (rough side towards drawer) then tighten the nut.

INK MARKS ON VINYL SURFACES can be lightened with cuticle remover. Apply & let set for a while. Some scrubbing may be necessary. Sometimes lemon juice and salt or rubbing alcohol or lighter fluid or toothpaste or a cut raw potato will remove the spot as well.

CLOVES can prevent molding in preserved jelly by placing several whole cloves on top of jelly in the jar.

TO KEEP FLIES AWAY FROM AROUND THE GAR-BAGE can place mothballs in the bottom of the garbage can (just a few). Odors will also diminish.

DO YOU HAPPEN TO HAVE A PAIR OF GOLF SHOES? Wear them to walk on your lawn, they open the soil so grass roots can grow stronger and receive water better.

TO ELIMINATE STATIC, mix one part fabric softener and 20 parts water, place in spritzer bottle and spray just a bit as needed.

CHAPPED LIPS? Use Crisco shortening!

PEACH MELBA SHORTCAKES

MADE WITH RASPBERRY PEACH CHAMPAGNE JAM

INGREDIENTS

- 3 T sugar
- 1 c cake flour
- C unbleached all-purpose flour
- 2 t cream of tartar
- 1 t baking soda


pinch grated nutmea

- 1 stick unsalted butter, chilled and cut into small pieces
- 1/4 c STONEWALL KITCHEN Raspberry Peach Champagne Jam
- 1 c heavy cream
- 1 t vanilla extract
- 6 hole firm ripe peaches, peeled and poached or 2 (16 oz) cans juice-packed peach halves

DIRECTIONS

- 1. PICK UP YOUR RASPEBRRY PEACH CHAMPAGNE JAM AT 524 S. MAIN ST. in MIDDLEBURY, IN.
- 2. Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Position rack in center of oven.
- 3. Combine 2 T of the sugar with flour, cream of tartar, baking soda, salt and nutmeg in a food processor. Process briefly to blend. Add butter and pulse until mixture resembles coarse meal. Pour in light cream and pulse just until mixture forms a soft dough. Do not overwork.
- 4. Roll dough on a floured surface, using a lightly floured rolling pin, to a thickness of 3/". Use a cookie cutter or shape by hand into circles about 3 to 3 1/2" in diameter, gathering scraps and re-rolling as necessary. Place on cookie sheet and bake until shortcakes are golden brown, about 13 – 16 minutes. Remove pan from oven and let cool.
- 5. Combine heavy cream, vanilla and remaining tablespoon of sugar in a chilled bowl and beat into soft peaks. Remove pits, from peaches, if using fresh peaches, and cut each half in four sections.
- 6. Split shortcakes horizontally, and moisten cut sides with a little of the poaching liquid or juice from the can. Arrange peaches on the bottom half of each shortcake. Spoon 2 teaspoons of Raspberry Peach Champagne Jam over peaches, then a large dollop of whipped cream. Place lids on top and garnish each with a small dollop of cream.

What does Northridge High School in Middlebury have that no other Indiana high school has? The 2011 Science Olympiad Indiana State Championship Team.

The 15-member team and their 8 alternates competed at Purdue University-Calumet campus in 23 different tests/ challenges with 26 other leading Science Olympiad teams from across the state. The challenges ranged from written tests to processing forensic evidence at a mock crime scene to taking the team's robotic companions through their paces. Of the 23 different tests/challenges, the team members from Northridge placed 1st in 3 events and 2nd in 7 other events.

"As one of the smaller schools competing at this year's state competition, I'm very proud of our team to come away with the championship," was the first statement from team faculty sponsor, Jeremy Gerber, a chemistry/physics teacher at Northridge. "Now, the team will set their sights on preparing for the national competition at the University of Wisconsin in Madison, WI, on May 21."

Bloomington South HS, placing 2nd at the state competition, will also represent Indiana at the nationals in May.

The team will be responsible for preparing themselves academically as well as raising the monies necessary for the transportation, food and lodging for the team and chaperones going to the nationals in Wisconsin. Anyone wishing to financially assist the Northridge Science Olympiad State Championship team can send checks to Northridge HS made out to "Northridge HS Science Olympiad."



MAY & MUSHROOMS

Ah, May, the month when children gaze longingly out classroom windows and the smell of freshcut grass calls, "Come outside and play!" The teacher's voice drones like the bees buzzing the dandelions on the hillside. Finally, the recess bell rings and the children burst outside to gallop and gambol across the playground like the spring colts in the surrounding meadows.

My first experience with the mighty Morel happened when my step-dad joined our family. Smart man that he is, he decided to take us camping because nothing bonds a family closer than 4 people living in a tent for a week!

Our new dad drove through the night, deep into the realm of the golden, sponge mushroom. We made it to...wait, I can't tell you where we went. Mushroom spots are more heavily guarded than secret government installations. Let's just say it was a little north of here...

We arrived just after sunrise and sharp shafts of rosy light streamed through the forest like sunbeams through the stained-glass windows of a great cathedral. A river of mist rose and rolled across a small lake. Clouds of it surged into a huge, stump-filled swamp. Startling white Birches loomed like ghosts. brother, Shaun, and I were fascinated by their thin, papery bark. We passed small, green meadows where wild grasses were softened by the morning dew. There was so much to see, so much to take in, a complete sensory overload, and the trees...trees were everywhere!

Shaun and I had never been camping in the big woods before. Truth is we'd never been camping anywhere except the backyard. We found ourselves in a great forest, a Hansel and Gretel-type forest, a forest where we could actually get lost!

Dad parked the car near a clearing nestled at the foot of a tall hill. While Mom, Dad and I made camp, Shaun started his own longstanding tradition of disappearing as soon as the fishing gear was unpacked. They seemed to sprout up right in front of us. We'd pick a bunch of 'shrooms, turn around, and there'd be more behind us. We hardly left the roadside before our bags were

There is something wondrous about mushrooms--especially the big ones! The intricate holes, delicate as fine lace; the tall, sturdy stalks; the earthy smell...the taste, the butter and flour, salt and pepper, the crisp, crunchy outside, the soft, juicy inside...

We ate until our bellies were full, then unzipped the tent and shuffled our poor, tired bodies inside. When I closed my eyes, mushrooms danced and trees swayed.

The night was dark, a whole new kind of dark, and full of strange sounds. A loon wailed a lonely cry out on the lake. A whippoorwill whistled shrilly from the brush. Twigs broke. Large, unknown creatures wandered near our camp, but tired and full, we just snuggled deeper into our sleeping bags and drifted off.

Many years have passed since that first May camping trip. I'm sorry to say we never found mushrooms like that again. We still go, hoping for another Mother Lode. The loons still wail and the whippoorwills still whistle but, somehow, the woods just don't seem as big.

FARM COUNT

"You're a good girl Sherlyn", I said to my young daughter as I rubbed her back to try to get her to wake up from her sleepy state. She really didn't feel like packing 4 lunches this morning, I observed; (who does really ... so early in the morning?) My 10 year old daughter pulled herself out of her chair to begin her morning. My mind raced back about 25 years ago. My own dad would sometimes encourage me with those words. In our (Amish) culture we are not a people known for our "physically" affectionate

ways. We are more of a reserved people in that way. But I could always feel my parents' love for me in my growing-up years. They showed us through their dedication to us. There were 10 of us kids in the family. Oh, the fun we would have! I never felt deprived even when there was no major outward show of affection. My dad was always there when we needed him and I recall my mom cooking us the best meals we could want; simple, but delicious. Our dilapidated farm house was definitely showing its age but we never lacked anything we really

needed. Sometimes I let my mind travel back (during those rare occasions I have some solitude which is usually in the bathtub). I distinctively recall my older sister and I chasing after each other with a broom on Saturdays when we were supposed to be cleaning house. Sometimes we'd spend more time arguing about who threw what toy in whose room than the time it took to clean the room and get it over with. But, in spite of our sibling rivalry back then, we're as close as two sisters could be. We were probably too much alike. Seems like the more

two people are alike the less they get along. Maybe that is why they say opposites attract. When we end up with a partner for marriage we find we're often opposite of each other. One talks, the other listens and so forth. One likes to go places, the other likes to stay home. One is a morning person, the other a night owl. I guess we find we need each other to keep us grounded. Anyway, after breakfast my dad would get out his big worn bible and read a chapter to us kids, who sometimes weren't too alert. He usually read in German, so that's where I learned

The chapters where Jesus died on the cross for our sins so we have eternal hope were especially dear to him. Isn't it wonderful that we don't have to be perfect to enter heaven? By grace we are saved, through his atoning blood. Then after that there were morning prayers in which he called one child's name and that child was expected to recite the Lord's Prayer out loud. Then our day would begin. Another thing that stands out is in the fall of the year when we'd fill our big silo with corn from the fields, we'd put it in the silage cutter and up it went into the big silo. I would feel pretty big when my dad gave me my own team of horses to drive to and fro from the field pulling a load of corn. But the best part of the day was the full course meal my mom would prepare for the silo filling crew of about half a dozen men or so (or were there more?) She'd start cooking as soon as the morning chores were done. We milked quite a few cows at that time. I recall she'd always spend most of the day in the kitchen, and be washing dishes 'til about 2:30PM in the afternoons. It was in ways like that, that made us kids feel loved. I hope I can convey that same message to my kids even though I'm only human

most of my German language.

When Momma Went Home

Her chair sits in the same place it always sat, with her nail file, box of tissue and the TV remote control neatly lined up on her side table. The Bible she read every day (as long as her eyes would let her) is missing – we made sure she has it with her. Her walker is poised beside her chair ready for use, and the cushion with the quilted cover (which she made) waits for her. But she won't be coming home...Mom went to her real "home" in April. She was just 4 days shy of her 90th birthday.

My Mom, affectionately known as "tough old bird", "old woman" and "Granny" as well as "Mom" and "Grandma", was quite a woman. She began her life in the "hollers"

of Kentucky, the oldest of 4 children born to poor dirt farmers. I suppose that's what made her so tough. She and my Dad eloped to Tennessee to get married before he went to the Army. When Dad finished his service time, it was back to Kentucky to farm. And along came two more boys. One boy died (crib death). Times were financially tough, so they came to Elkhart where Dad got a job in a paper mill. Then I came along, and a few years later, my sister joined us.

With Dad working long hours to keep us in clothes and put food on the table, Mom ruled us kids with an iron... willow switch. She knew where we were all the time and if she checked, we had better be where we said we were going or we paid the price. Mom nursed us when we were sick; she fussed over our accomplishments. And she loved us - that fact we never doubted. Mom loved us – good or bad – all through our lives. There's nothing quite like a mother's love. When she had to go to the hospital the last time, even through all the pain and medication, she looked up at me and said, "Why aren't you at work? You're going to mess around here with me and lose your job!" Still trying to watch out for me!

After the hospital, Mom spent the next week at a nursing home. She could hear us and sometimes managed to say something, but she wasn't able to fight off the terrible infection that was overtaking her body. Abiding by her wishes, we had her transferred to a hospice facility and began what is called comfort care. The last time that I was sure she was still able to hear me, I whispered in her ear, "When you get to the other side, tell Daddy and Bill (my late husband) I love them and give them both a big hug for me." She smiled. I knew she was ready to go home. And three days later, she did.

Right after Mom breathed her last breath, I headed outside with my cell phone to call my daughter. As I opened the door at the hospice house, I saw a sight that took my breath away. It was so wonderful I called my brothers to the door to see. As we watched through our tears, a beautiful bluebird with its red breast looked our way, flew to my brother David's car, then to my car, then to my brother Kenny's car. The bird then looked toward us again, and flew away. Even through our tears, we all looked at each other and broke into smiles.

You see, Mom loved spring. Many times over the last couple of years she said she hoped the good Lord called her home in the spring. She absolutely loved the sight of the first flowers and all the colorful birds that came back from their winter homes. She would call me almost every day to tell me what flowers were up and blooming and what birds were at her feeders. And bluebirds were her favorite.

and fail often. God has blessed us with 5 daughters and 4 sons; ages 1 year to 14 years old. We milk 46 cows on our dairy farm at this point and work the fields with our horses. They sure do get lazy and spoiled during the winter months. But we all need a break sometimes, right? But back to my 10 year old, packing lunches. My 3 oldest girls rotate jobs every week so there is always one who helps me in the house during chore time. Their job in the morning consists of packing lunches, putting the clean, air dried dishes back in the cupboard from the evening before, and sweeping throughout the house. I will usually do laundry (every other morning) or do odds and ends around the house. I also try to get a warm breakfast on the table by the time they come in from milking cows. At 8:10 the 4 scholars leave the house to go to school with the pony and cart. If




